Helen Cartwright Graff Scholarship

Helen Cartwright Graff established this scholarship with the intent to help deserving local students who have financial need and real interest in learning. According to Helen, "My college years are long past, but I remember how much I would have welcomed even a small scholarship. My family had very limited means, and I was completely on my own in paying for college. Scholarships, grants, and student loans were practically unheard of in those years. I know all about tight budgeting in college."

She wants to encourage students to attend UW-Oshkosh because her campus experience there was wonderful. UW-Oshkosh not only prepared her for a career as a teacher, but also for life-long learning. "Studying

English seemed a natural choice for me, and I have never regretted that choice. Because I loved to share whatever knowledge I had, an education major was another easy choice. Officer Bill Kautzer Memorial Scholarship

The Officer Bill Kautzer Memorial Scholarship was developed to honor the life of Bill Kautzer. Bill was a Nekoosa Police Officer for 26 years and the Nekoosa School District Liaison Officer. He was known to all Nekoosa youth as "Officer Bill", and served as a powerful and positive role model and mentor in many of the youth's lives.

A graduate of Nekoosa High School, athletics was important to Bill. He was inducted into the Nekoosa Hall of Fame for achievements in football, basketball, and baseball. He was an All-State Pitcher his senior year. After graduation, Bill was drafted by the Chicago White Sox organization in which he played professional ball for four years.

Bill's commitment to the youth of the community extended far beyond his work setting. He was the Nekoosa High School Varsity Softball Coach for eight years and coached nine to 12 year old girls' softball and basketball teams for nine years. Bill could guide others in a funny, yet disciplined way, and remain enthusiastic and positive. In turn, he made others believe in themselves and succeed.

Bill strongly believed in volunteerism and commitment to the community. He was a board member of Incourage for three years, former Lion's Club member, and an active member of Bethlehem Lutheran Church. He was also a member of many fundraising committees to benefit Nekoosa throughout his adult life.

However, Bill's greatest compassion and commitment was for his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and his family – his wife Nancy, their three daughters, and grandchildren. He lost his battle for life on January 11, 2015, to brain cancer. He fought this disease with dignity, selflessness, and determination. This scholarship will help to keep his spirit alive.

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Thomas F. and Nancy Z. Plunkett Scholarship Established in honor of Frances Nairn, former Guidance Director at Lincoln High School

Tom was a sophomore student at Lincoln High School when he met with Ms. Nairn, Guidance Director. She started talking to him about going to college and changing out of the commercial courses that he was taking. Convincing him to attend the University of Wisconsin-Madison, she was instrumental in helping him to complete the proper paperwork to get

accepted, secure a couple of scholarships and get a job working in the dorm kitchen.

Tom graduated from UW-Madison with a Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering and a Master of Science in Nuclear Engineering. His 39-year career in the nuclear power industry began at McDonnell Douglas Corporation and would eventually lead him to Florida Power & Light Company (FPL). It was there he served as President of the Nuclear Division and member of the Board of Directors. During his time at FPL, he was responsible for the operation of four nuclear units, two at Turkey Point in south Dade County and two at St. Lucie on Hutchinson Island in St. Lucie County, as well as the associated support activities at corporate headquarters in Juno Beach, Florida. During his tenure at Turkey Point, the facility progressed from one of the nation's most troubled power stations to one of the best. Tom was awarded the University of Wisconsin's Distinguished Service Citation for achievement of excellence and outstanding leadership in the nuclear power industry and the American Nuclear Society's Presidential Citation for Special Contributions to the Advancement of Nuclear Science and Technology. He retired in 2001.

Nancy is from Milwaukee. She and Tom met while working together in the dorm kitchen at UW-Madison. She attended three years at Madison. Following their marriage, she finished her undergraduate degree at UCLA receiving a Bachelor of Arts in English. She then received a fellowship to USC where she earned a Master of Science in Education. She had a career as a middle school teacher, primarily teaching science and reading.

In reflecting how Ms. Nairn impacted his life, Tom says, "Thanks to this woman, I had a very good career and life with Nancy and our four children. Looking back, it is quite amazing the effect she was able to have on me. As a result, we have decided to set up this scholarship to honor Ms. Nairn and to hopefully help future students who are pursuing a degree in education."

Tips for Scholarship Applicants

What types of higher education will Incourage scholarships support?

Donors determine the criteria for scholarships. We have scholarships for applicants attending technical colleges, universities, and specialty schools. Most scholarships, but not all, require full-time enrollment.

What should I know? It is important to use an email account set up specifically for you. Make it a point to check your email account on a regular basis until scholarship awards are announced as we may send messages that require a timely response.

How does the application process work?

- Incourage uses an online platform called SmarterSelect. Start by answering a few basic questions to get a list of all scholarships that you may be eligible for. Review the criteria. If you meet ALL the requirements for a particular scholarship, save it to your applications.
- You may wish to concentrate on completing the field specific or those scholarships available only to your high school as there are typically fewer applicants. Go on to complete ALL applications that you qualify for. You cannot receive a scholarship that you did not apply for.
- You are able to save your information and return later to update.
- Information entered in Pages 1-13 serves as the base for nearly all scholarships administered by Incourage. You will only need to complete this section once!

How many Letters of Recommendation do I need?

- You need only two letters of recommendation, regardless of the number of scholarships that you apply for through Incourage.
- Ask someone who knows you well and can write about your characteristics or activities with first-hand knowledge.
- Online, enter contact information in the Letter of Recommendation section as soon as possible. Doing so early in the process will help ensure your recommenders have sufficient time to complete their recommendation letter. You may need to follow up with your recommender.
- Parents and immediate family members are NOT eligible to write letters of recommendation.
- The first letter of recommendation may be, but does not have to be, from someone who knows
 you academically. The second letter of recommendation MUST be from someone outside of
 your normal school day activities. This could include a coach, club advisor, employer, neighbor,
 or someone you have worked with during on a volunteer activity, etc.

Tips for Scholarship Applicants (continued)

Importance of essays:

- A well-written essay can make the difference between receiving or not receiving a scholarship. The best essays give the reader a better picture of you. Tell <u>your</u> story.
- We recommend that you compose your essay in a Word document first, and don't indent your paragraphs. When you paste your essay online, indentations don't transfer well from online into our application merge, so please enter a blank line space between paragraphs.

Is there a minimum GPA? Incourage has a wide variety of scholarships – some have GPA requirements, many do not. If a minimum GPA is stated, we do NOT round in determining eligibility. Example: Applicant who has a cumulative GPA of 2.98 would not be eligible to apply for a scholarship with a requirement of 3.00.

Proofread before you submit your work:

- Follow the directions carefully. Incomplete applications may not be considered.
- Use proper spelling, capitalization, and punctuation.
- Ask someone to review your application for accuracy and completeness.

When will I be notified if I have been selected to receive a scholarship?

For most scholarship awards: High school students will receive their award letter at their school awards program; continuing college and non-traditional students will be notified via U.S. Postal Service near the end of May.

What do I need to do to receive my scholarship award?

- Your award letter will contain the details of your award and any special conditions.
- Multi-semester awards require some form of documentation like transcripts or proof of enrollment for the next semester.
- Keep a copy of the Recipient Agreement and make a notation on your calendar.
 It is your responsibility to provide documentation. Reminder letters will NOT be sent!

What other scholarships are available?

• We suggest students visit their guidance/student services office for applications, assistance, and updates on new scholarship opportunitites as they become available.
