Area:	Give Constructive Criticism
Title:	Avoid the Negative
Objective:	Students generate specific ideas and words to use when giving constructive criticism.
Materials:	"Avoid the Negative" Statements List (Optional: You may wish to make this into an overhead transparency for visual learners.)
Activity:	1. Divide the class into two equal teams.
	2. Explain the directions below.
	"Today's game requires that you turn negative statements into 'constructive criticism'. Each person will have five seconds to determine a way to transform a negative statement to a positive statement. I will be the judge. I will read to you the negative statement, and then time will begin. If you get it correct, you will earn 5 points for your team. If not, the other team gets a try for 3 points."
	3. Play the game as long as time allows or statements are unanswered.
Closure:	 Discuss the following (or journal): "What kinds of statements were easy to rephrase" "What kinds of statements were difficult to rephrase?" "What kinds of statements do you personally say? Does this activity help you to think of other ways of giving criticism?"
